Processing Information

Place names were modernized in the description, with the name originally used in the collection material or in an older version of the finding aid in parenthesis: e.g. "Beijing (Peking)" or "Benin (Dahomey)".

Biographical / Historical

The papers in this collection were gathered at Andover Newton Theological Seminary and transferred to the Yale Divinity School Library in 2017 when Andover Newton became affiliated with Yale Divinity School. Andover Newton traces its roots to the early 1800s and the desire to prepare a well-educated clergy among both Congregationalist and Baptists. With the 1778 founding of Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts, and the establishment of a separate department of divinity in 1807, the Andover Theological Seminary was created. Instruction at the southern Merrimack River Valley campus continued until 1907, when the trustees decided to move the school to the urban setting of Cambridge, Massachusetts, to broaden the curriculum and establish closer ties with the academic world. In 1908, plans for a formal affiliation with Harvard Divinity School were started, but merger attempts resulted in a legal struggle over adherence to Andover's founding principles.

The move to Cambridge left the school with a dwindling enrollment. In 1931, at the invitation of the Newton Theological Institution, Andover relocated to Newton Centre. In 1965, the two schools formally merged, forming the Andover Newton Theological School.

Scope and Contents

This collection contains correspondence, diaries, writings and/or other papers and memorabilia of various individuals, including graduates and former faculty members of Andover Theological Seminary, Newton Theological Institution and Andover Newton Theological School, as well as clergy, church leaders and missionaries. The papers of these men and women have been placed in the Andover Newton Miscellaneous Personal Papers record group because the quantity or substance of the material did not warrant a separate record group.

The papers are arranged alphabetically by the names of the individuals.

Collection Contents

Series I: Individuals A-L

Adams, James Luther

James Luther Adams (1901-1994) graduated from the University of Minnesota and Harvard Divinity School. After graduation from Harvard in 1927 Adams went to Heidelberg, Germany for a term of study and attended public meetings of the Nazis. Adams served as minister of Unitarian churches in Salem and Wellesley Hills, Massachusetts from 1927 to 1935. He returned to Germany for several months in 1936 and 1938 and was acquainted with several notable religious figures (including Karl Barth and Albert Schweitzer) who were active in secret resistance to the rise of Nazism. Adams taught first at Meadville Theological School and then was Professor of Christian Ethics at Harvard Divinity School from 1956 until 1968. After his retirement from Harvard, Adams taught at Andover Newton Theological School and Meadville Lombard Theological School.

He was especially attracted to Rudolf Otto who taught at Marburg University and was an avowed anti-Nazi, and to Peter Brunner, a Lutheran pastor and theological teacher. Brunner, whom Adams had previously known at Harvard, was at this time a leader in the anti-Nazi Confessing Church movement. Adams's personal encounters with Nazism included being detained for questioning by the Gestapo.	1983

Anderson, Frederick Lincoln

Anderson was born on April 14, 1862 in St. Louis, Missouri. He graduated from the University of Chicago in 1882 and from 1882 to 1885 was Assistant Professor of Latin there. In 1888 he received a B.D. from Baptist Union Theological Seminary, Morgan Park, Illinois and was ordained as a Baptist minister. After serving briefly as Acting Pastor, Second Baptist Church, St. Louis, from 1888 October to 1900 he was Pastor of Second Baptist Church, Rochester, NY. From 1900 to 1933 he was Professor of Biblical Interpretation, Newton Theological Institution. He studied at the University of Berlin 1904-1905. He died on January 23, 1938 in Newton Centre, Massachusetts.

The papers document the professional work of Anderson. The bulk of the collection consists of newspaper clippings arranged by Anderson. With the exception of 2 notebooks on Luke and Romans and a student grade book, the remaining items relate to Anderson's work at Second Baptist Church in Rochester, NY.

Andros, Thomas

Thomas Andros was born May 1, 1759, in Norwich, Connecticut. He joined the revolutionary army at the age of 16 and fought in the battles of Long Island and White Plains. He enlisted on a privateer in New London in 1781, but was captured and kept on a prison ship in New York. A few months later he escaped and began studying theology in Plainfield, Connecticut, with clergyman Joel Benedict. He was ordained in Berkley, Massachusetts, in 1788 and remained at the First Congregational Church there for 46 years. He died in Berkley on December 30, 1845.

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Anthony, Alfred Williams

Anthony (1869-1939) was born in Providence, RI and graduated from Brown University (1883) and Cobb Divinity School (1885). He was ordained to the Free Baptist ministry in 1885 and pastored the Essex Street Church in Bangor, Maine from 1885 to 1888. He was professor of New Testament Exegesis at Cobb Divinity School from 1890-1908 and professor of Christian Literature and Ethics at Bates College 1908-1911. Thereafter he served in various administrative positions for the Free Baptist and American Baptist churches.

Bailey (1871-1951) was an authority on art and religion. He taught classics, religious education, and English at the Worcester Academy (1891-1910), was head master of the Allen English and Classical School, West Newton, Massachusetts (1900-07), and thereafter traveled and lectured. He was an instructor in religious pedagogy at the Newton Theological Institution and Andover Theological Seminary.

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Barrows, Homer

Barrows was born in Wareham, MA in 1806. He graduates from Amherst College in 1821 and received a certificate from Andover Theological Seminary in 1834. Ordained as a Congregational minister in 1836, he served churches in Lakeville, MA (1836-1842, 1869-1872), Norton, MA (1842-1845), Dover, NH (1845-1852), Wareham, MA (1852-1859), and Plaistow, NH (1859-1869). He died in Andover, MA in 1881.

Bartlett was born in Warner, NH in 1870. He graduated from Amherst College in 1894 and attended Union Theological Seminary, NY 1894-1896. He received a B.D. from Andover Theological Seminary in 1897 and was ordained as a Congregational minister. He served the Rockdale Church in Northbridge, MA (1897-1900), the church in Kingston, MA (1900-1904), and Pilgrim Church, Madison, WI (1904-1905). He died in Madison, WI in 1905.

Berkeley, James Percival

Berkeley was born in Salt Lake City, UT on January 21, 1879. He graduated from Marietta College, OH in 1905 and received a B.D. from Newton Theological Institution in 1908. He was ordained at First Baptist Church, Bellingham, MA on September 29, 1908. From 1909 to 1950 he taught at Newton Theological Institution in the fields of Religious Education and Bible, with breaks for study at the University of Glasgow (1914-1915) and Union Theological Seminary, New York (1919). Berkeley died September 19, 1971 in Newton, MA

Bigelow (1797-1877) was born in Boylston, MA. After attending Phillips Academy, he graduated from Harvard in 1823 and from Andover Theological Seminary in 1826. He served churches in Walpole, MA (1828-1849) and Hancock, NH (1850-1877).

Boardman was a founding member of the Brotherhood of the Kingdom in 1892, and was active in the Social Gospel movement.</p>

Boynton, Nehemiah

Nehemiah Boynton was born November 21, 1856 in Medford, Ma. He graduated from Phillips Academy, Andover, and Amherst College. Following his graduation from Andover Theological Seminary in 1882 he was ordained and served as a Congregational clergyman in Littleton (1882-1884), North Church, Haverhill (1884-1888), Union Church, Boston (1888-1896), First Church, Detroit (1896-1906), and Clinton Avenue Church, Brooklyn (1906-1920). He served as a trustee of Andover Theological Seminary 1907-1916, including as president of the Board 1914-1916. Boynton died November 8, 1933 in Medford, MA.

Calkins, Wolcott

Calkins was born on June 10, 1831 in Corning, NY. He graduated from Yale College in 1856 and taught at schools in New Haven, CT and Worcester, MA from 1856 to 1859. He attended Union Theological Seminary, NY from 1859-1860 and the University of Halle, Germany from 1860 to 1862. He was ordained as a Congregational minister in 1862 and served the following churches: First Congregational, Hartford, CT (1862-1864), Calvary Presbyterian, Philadelphia, PA (1864-1866), North Presbyterian, Buffalo, NY (1866-1880), Eliot Congregational, Newton, MA (1880-1895), Montvale Congregational, Woburn, MA (1898-1907). He died in Newton, MA on December 31, 1924.

Carpenter, Chapin Howard

Born on June 29, 1835 in Milford, NH, Carpenter graduated from Harvard College (1859) and Newton Theological Institution (1862). He was ordained in 1862 and appointed by the American Baptist Missionary Union for service in Burma (now Myanmar). He served at the Rangoon mission until 1868 and then at the Basein mission until his return to the United States in 1880 due to ill health, except for one year as President of Rangoon Baptist College (1874-1875). Carpenter published writings on the subject of self-supporting missions. He resigned from the American Baptist Missionary Union in 1886 and travelled to Nemura, Japan to establish an independent mission. He died there on February 2, 1887.

Costas, Orlando E.

Orlando Enrique Costas (1942-1987) was a prominent Hispanic Protestant theologian who served as academic dean at Andover Newton Theological School from 1984 to 1987. Born in Puerto Rico, Costas came to the U.S. as a child. He served as a missionary in Puerto Rico and as a pastor as well as teaching at various theological seminaries before coming to Andover Newton.

This fragmentary collection of materials serves to illustrate Costas' interests and participation in conferences, consultations, and educational work related to missiology, contextual theology, and Christianity in Latin America. For material related to Costas' work as dean see RG 277 Andover Newton Theological School Records. Some writings of Costas are available in RG 279, Andover Newton Faculty Publications.

Davis, Jacob

Jacob Davis was born in Dighton, MA, August 16, 1812. After his conversion as a young man he felt called to ministry and began a course of study by himself, while continuing work at his trade of masonry and building construction. Some sources indicate that he studied at Andover Theological Seminary ca.1838; however, there is no record of his enrollment in school records. He was licensed to preach by North Baptist Church, Dorchester, MA. For several years he served as a pulpit supply in area churches and continued working in his trade. He was ordained as pastor of the Baptist church in North Marshfield, MA, in 1863. He had succeeding pastorates in Florida, MA, 1870-1878, and Rowe, MA, 1878-1889. Upon his retirement he returned to Marshfield, where he died October 22, 1903.

Dyer, Vernelle Wallace

Fackre, Gabriel

Fackre was Professor of Theology and Culture at Lancaster Theological Seminary from 1961 to 1970. He was Samuel Abbot Professor of Christian Theology at Andover Newton Theological School from 1971 to 1996. Fackre was a prominent theologian and active in social justice and ecumenical activities. He died in Oregon City, OR on January 31, 2018.

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Judson, Adoniram

Adoniram Judson was born in Malden, Massachusetts, August 8, 1788. He graduated from Brown University in 1807 and from Andover Theological Seminary in 1810. While at Andover, he became a member of a student group, The Brethren, which was organized to encourage interest in the foreign missions movement. He was a leader of the group of students who petitioned the General Association of Massachusetts for financial support in missionary work, a move which later resulted in the formation of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. In 1811 he was appointed one of the first five missionaries sent from the United States. He married Ann Hasseltine, February 5, 1812, and the following day was ordained at Tabernacle Church in Salem. Later that month Adoniram and Ann left for India with Samuel and Harriet Newell. During the voyage Judson studied the question of baptism. After further study of the issue in India, the Judsons became convinced of the validity of the Baptist tenet of believer baptism; and both Adoniram and Ann were baptized by English missionaries. After months of frustration in dealing with authorities of the East India Company and after a brief layover in the Isle of France, the Judsons finally arrived in Burma in 1813 under the sponsorship of Baptists in the United States. Judson's entire missionary service was in Burma. In addition to published works on baptism and the missionary cause, Judson is well known for a translation of the Bible into the Burmese language and publication of an English-Burmese dictionary. The Burmese -English portion of the dictionary was unfinished at the time of his death, and was completed by Edward A. Stevens, a missionary colleague. In April, 1850, Judson died during a sea voyage.

King, Henry Melville

King was born September 3, 1838 in Oxford, Maine. He graduated from Bowdoin College and Newton Theological Institution and was ordained on August 28, 1862. He served as an Assistant Instructor of Hebrew at NTI from 1859 to 1863. He served the Dudley Street Baptist Church, Boston from 1863 to 1881, Emmanuel Baptist Church, Albany, NY from 1882 to 1891, and First Baptist Church, Providence, RI from 1891 to 1906. He was an author during his retirement from 1906 until his death on June 16, 1919 in Providence.

Leverett served as a professor at Shurtleff College in Illinois from 1839 to 1868. He died on November 8, 1872 and Washington died on December 13, 1889. Daniel Novotny (11 Jun 1926 - 18 Oct 2001) was a United Church of Christ (UCC) minister who served churches in Goshen CT, Exeter, NH, Bridgewater, MA, and Belmont MA. Both he and his wife, Jean, were graduates of Union Theological Seminary. He is a co-author of *The Art of Theological Reflection: An Ecumenical Study* (Lanham, MD: University Press of America, 1987) along with Ronald Gariboldi; Jean Novotny edited the volume. In retirement in the 1990s, the couple lived at Andover Newton Theological Seminary, where Jean worked in Field Education and Dan served as chaplain and taught some courses.

Novotny had an interesting relationship with the author Madeleine L'Engle. In a review of Sarah Arthur's biography of L'Engle, Jeffrey Johnson writes: "In the early 1950s, as L'Engle pursued her literary ambition, she moved with her family from New York City, where she and her husband worked in the theater business, to Goshen, Connecticut. From an old farmhouse of "charming confusion," L'Engle parented her young children, operated a general store, and tried to kick-start her literary career. Early in this spiritually and vocationally unsettled period, she confessed to a Congregational minister that she did not believe in God but she found it impossible to live as if she did not believe in God. In spite of this comment—or perhaps on account of it—the minister asked L'Engle to teach Sunday school" ("*The spirit of Madeleine L'Engle*," *Christian Century*, May 23, 2019). That minister was Daniel Novotny.

Smyth, Egbert Coffin

Smyth was born August 24, 1829 in Brunswick, Maine. He graduated from Bowdoin College in 1848 and Bangor Theological Seminary in 1853. Ordained as a Congregational minister in 1856, he served at Bowdoin College as Professor of Rhetoric and Oratory 1854-1856, and Professor of Natural and Revealed Religion 1856-1862. Following study at Berlin and Halle Universities, Smyth was Professor of Ecclesiastical History at Andover Theological Seminary from 1863 to 1904 and Lecturer in Pastoral Theology 1863-1868. He was editor of the *Andover Review* from 1884-1893. Smyth died in Andover on April 12, 1904.

Willard, Benjamin

Benjamin Willard was born in Lancaster, MA. in 1783. He joined the Baptist Church in Harvard, MA in 1800 and was licensed to preach by that church in 1818. He conducted missionary tours in northern New England and Canada under the sponsorship of the Massachusetts Baptist Missionary Society 1818-1821. He began ministry in Northampton, MA in 1822 and was ordained in 1823. The Baptist Church in Northampton was formally organized in 1826. He continued as pastor of the Northampton Church until 1838. For several years thereafter he did evangelistic work among Vermont Baptist Churches. Willard died in Holyoke, MA December 2, 1862.

Woods graduated from Harvard in 1796 and was ordained as pastor of the Congregational Church in West Newbury, MA in 1798. He was a founder of of Andover Theological Seminary and served as Professor of Christian Theology there from 1808 to 1846, and as Professor Emeritus until his death in 1854.

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Woods, Leonard (1807-1878)

Woods, son of Andover Theological Seminary professor Leonard Woods, was born on November 24, 1807 in Newbury, Massachusetts. He graduated from Union College in 1827 and from Andover Theological Seminary in 1830. His translation of Georg Christian Knapp's *Christian Theology* (1831-1833) was long used as a textbook in American theological seminaries. After serving as professor of sacred literature at Bangor Theological Seminary for three years, Woods was president of Bowdoin College from 1839 to 1866. He died in Boston on December 24, 1878.
