SUMMARY: The Annie Burr Lewis and Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis Photograph Collection consists of prints, negatives, transparencies, slides, and tintypes that provide visual documentation of the lives, family, friends, and activities of Wilmarth and Annie Burr Lewis. The images range from formal portraits by noted artists such as Arnold Genthe and Yousuf Karsh, to hundreds of snapshots taken by friends and family, and by Annie Lewis herself. The material spans a full century in date, from a group of tintypes to photographs of family members through snapshots taken of Wilmarth Lewis before his death in 1979, but most of the images date from the first half of the twentieth century and cover the couple's childhoods through the death of Annie Lewis in 1959.

Annie Burr Lewis (1902-1959)

Annie Burr Auchincloss Lewis was born in Newport, Rhode Island, on July 22, 1902, the daughter of Emma Jennings Auchincloss and Hugh Dudley Auchincloss. She attended Miss Porter's School in Farmington, Connecticut, and married Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis in New York in 1928. She died in Hartford, Connecticut, on May 9, 1959.

Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis (1895-1979)

Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis was born in Alameda, California, on November 14, 1895, the son of Miranda Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis and Azro Nathaniel Lewis. He attended the Thacher School in Ojai, California, and Yale University (Class of 1918). He met Annie Burr Auchincloss in Farmington, Connecticut, in 1923, and the couple were married in 1928. Together they spent three decades building a collection of books, prints, paintings, manuscripts, and decorative arts related to Horace Walpole, his circle, and his time, and formed a research library at their home in Farmington. Lewis died in Hartford on October 7, 1979; he left his home and collections to Yale University by bequest.

Scope and Contents

The Annie Burr Lewis and Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis Photographs consists of prints, negatives, transparencies, slides, and tintypes that provide visual documentation of the couple's lives, family, friends, and activities. The images range from formal portraits by noted artists such as Arnold Genthe and Yousuf Karsh, to hundreds of snapshots taken by friends and family. A good portion of the photographs were taken by Annie Lewis herself. She was an avid photographer and unfortunately, because she was behind

the lens, images of her form only a small part of the collection—a rare photo of her posing with her camera in San Francisco in March 1939 can be found in the album in Box 31. Fortunately, however, Annie Lewis was mindful about captioning photographs, especially in the eleven albums she composed, and it is because of her careful work that many of the faces and places in the couple's picture collection can be identified today. She mounted prints in standard commercially available albums, but also created albums by affixing prints to pages in leather-bound volumes purchased as blank books or that formerly held Walpoliana collected by the couple.

The images span a full century in date, from a group of tintypes to photographs of family members through snapshots taken of Wilmarth Lewis before his death in 1979, though most are from the first half of the twentieth century and cover the couple's childhoods through the death of Annie Lewis in 1959. Both brought into their marriage, or later inherited, a variety of family photographs. Wilmarth Lewis, in particular, was the recipient of pictures and genealogical material owned by his brothers in California, which had been sent east by Charles, his only surviving sibling, prior to his death in 1969. The earliest item in the collection is not a photograph but the case that once held a daguerreotype or ambrotype of Annie Lewis's father Hugh Dudley Auchincloss (1858-1913) and his mother Elizabeth Buck Auchincloss, taken in 1859; the image itself is unlocated.

While much of the material in the collection is in black and white, there are many color photographs present. Notable are the approximately 250 sheet film transparencies and more than 600 slides taken by Annie Lewis, and from which she regularly had color prints made by the Pavelle laboratory in New York. Another remarkable group of color images exists in the two sets of stereo slides in the collection, which document the interiors of the Lewises' homes, the Major General Solomon Cowles House (1784) in Farmington, Connecticut, and the Jahleel Brenton farmhouse (1720) at Hammersmith Farm in Newport, Rhode Island. They are accompanied by a Realist Red Button stereo slide viewer which provides that format's intended three-dimensional effect.

Collection Contents

Series I: Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis, 1895–1979

The series holds portraits of Wilmarth Lewis made throughout his life, as well as photographs that document his involvement with various organizations, institutions, and groups. The first subseries, Portraits, contains images of Lewis photographed alone, by commercial studios or informally in snapshots by friends and family. The Activities subseries shows Lewis at dedications, conferences, dinners, and events, as well as receiving awards. Five folders at the end of the series contain snapshot photographs of him relaxing with friends and family, playing croquet, and posing with his beloved dogs.

Many additional photographs of Lewis appear in Annie Lewis's photograph albums in Series II, Boxes 29-32.

Series II: Annie Burr Lewis, 1903–1959*13.73 linear feet (13 boxes)*

The series holds images of Annie Lewis photographed alone and in activities with friends and family. Her formal portraits start in infancy with images by the Alman & Co. studio, and continue with nationally prominent artists Curtis Bell and Arnold Genthe, and other professional studios in New York and Hartford. Also present in the Portraits subseries is a curiosity: a glass plate negative and two prints of a portrait painted by Ellen Emmet Rand which is similar to—but is not—the painting owned by the Lewises and now in the Lewis Walpole Library.

Compared with images of Wilmarth Lewis and friends in the other series, there are many fewer candid photographs of Annie Lewis engaged in activities, primarily because she was usually the one behind the camera.

As the eleven photograph albums in the Lewises' photograph collection were created by Annie Lewis, they are filed here although they hold images of both Lewises and their family and friends. Their contents were generally described at the item level for ease of access to images by location, event, or date. Many of the unidentified photographs in Series VI may be identified by checking images against those in the albums.

Series II is organized into three subseries: Portraits, Activities, and Albums, and arranged chronologically thereunder.

Albums

Annie Lewis kept a series of albums, with photographs arranged sequentially from 1896 through 1958, which document her travels and activities. Favorite places visited regularly include her two homes in Farmington and Newport; those of her relatives in Fairfield, Connecticut, and Jekyll Island, Georgia; and friends in Salisbury, Connecticut (Whitridge) and Conway, Massachusetts (MacLeish).

Another album, the Cowles House guest register, titled *A Book of Hospitalities and a Record of Guests*, is in the Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis Papers (LWL MSS 20), Box 291. It holds a chronology of snapshots of friends and family who came to stay with the Lewises in Farmington and were photographed (likely by Annie Lewis) during their visit; the small-scale prints were then glued to the pages where the guests' signatures appeared.

Series IV: Family and Friends, 1859–1975*2.33 linear feet (3 boxes)*

The series includes both formal studio portraits and snapshot photographs of the Lewises' family members and friends. The folders for the couple's siblings may contain images from all stages of their lives as well as images of their children and grandchildren.

In addition to the photographs filed here, Annie Lewis's albums (Series II, Boxes 5, 25, and 28-31) contain many pictures of Auchincloss and Lewis siblings and their children. Auchincloss and Jennings family members attending Annie Burr Jennings's Christmas costume dinners can be found in Series II (Box 4, folder 19, and Box 22, folder 13).

Many other photographs of friends and family appear in the Cowles House guest register, *A Book of Hospitalities and a Record of Guests*, in the Wilmarth Sheldon Lewis Papers (LWL MSS 20), into which Annie Lewis would paste her snapshots of friends and family who came to visit the Lewises in Farmington.

Series V: Places, 1860–1978*6.59 linear feet (7 boxes + 1 broadside + 1 roll)*

The series contains views of houses and other locations owned or frequented by the Lewises and their relatives. The earliest images document two ancestral homes in San Francisco, but the bulk of the material pertains to the Lewises' two homes, the Cowles House in Farmington, Connecticut, and "The Castle" at Hammersmith Farm in Newport, Rhode Island. Formats include prints, negatives, color slides and transparencies, postcards, and stereo slides.

There are several sets of views of the interiors, exteriors, and grounds of the Farmington house and its additions, taken between 1935 and 1977 by professional photographers hired both by the Lewises and by magazine publishers. There are no professional photographs of the Newport house in the collection, with the exception of a set of color stereo slides by the New York-based architectural photographer Henry S. Fullerton 3rd; the slides provide the only known images of the home's interiors. Both residences were popular subjects for Annie Lewis over many years, so scores of images of each exist in the series.

Also present are photographs of the houses the Lewises occupied during their years in Washington, DC (1941-1944), and many views taken of other homes, gardens, and streets in Farmington. The series concludes with photographs taken during excursions abroad, in particular their visits to England. Many more photographs from those trips can be found in Annie Lewis's albums in Series II.
