Processing Information

All of the deity names are expressed in accordance with the Library of Congress Authority File.

Descriptions of individual items derive chiefly from catalog cards created by Wesley E. Needham (Yale 1954 Hon. M.A.H.) at the time of acquisition, as well as from a survey of the material completed by Paul A. Draghi in June 1994.

Tankas

Tankas, also known as thangkas, are hanging scrolls or fabric temple banners that consist of a painted picture panels (called *mélong* in Tibetan, which means 'mirror'), usually depicting buddhas, mandalas, or great practitioners, which are sewn into or bordered by a textile mountings. Tankas are intended to serve as records of, and guides for, contemplative experiences and visualizations.

Scope and Contents

The collection consists of 77 tankas, chiefly Tibetan, but also Nepalese, Bhutanese, Indian and Chinese, which bear religious images, circa 1600-circa 1950. Some tankas also bear inscriptions on their versos.

Divinities represented in the collection include Akṣobhya, Amitābha, Amitāyus, Avalokiteśvara, Bardo Thodol deities, Bhaiṣajyaguru, Dorje Shugden, Garwai Nagpo Damchen, Hayagrīva, Mahākāla, Palden Lhamo, Prajñāpāramitā, Rāhula, Sitāpatrā, Tārā, Vajrabhairava, Vajrapāṇi, Vajrasattva, Vajrayoginī, Vasudhārā, and Viśrāvāṇa.

Buddhist practitioners with portraits in the collection include Gautama Buddha, his arhats (disciples), Kloṅ-chen-pa Dri-med-'od-zer, Lobsang Chökyi Gyaltzen, Mi-la-ras-pa, Nag-dbañ-blo-bzañ-rgya-mtsho, Padma Sambhava, Tsoñ-kha-pa Blo-bzañ-grags-pa, and Yungtön Dorjepel, as well as unidentified Karmapa abbots and an unidentified Sa-skyapa lama.

Portrayals of inanimate objects and locations include srid-pa-ho (astrological divination charts), a srid-pa'i-'khor-lo (wheel of life), rgyan-tshogs (offerings), a stupa and a mandala.

Identified artists in the collection consist of Tsewang Norbu, an artist active in Darjeeling, India, circa 1865, as well as Rin-zin (or Rig-zin), a artist active in Sikkim, India, circa 1950.

Arrangement

Organized into two series: I. Identified Creators, circa 1865-circa 1950. II. Identified Subjects, circa 1600-circa 1950.

Series I: Identified Creators, circa 1865-circa 1950

(8 paintings)

Tankas created by identified Indian artists or attributed to unidentified Tibetan and Nepalese artists.

This series is organized alphabetically by the artist, followed by groups of tankas by an unidentified Tibetan and Nepalese artists.

Rin-zin (or Rig-zin)

Rin-zin (or Rig-zin) was an artist active in Sikkim, India, circa 1950.

Mañjuśrī is a bodhisattva associated with transcendent wisdom.

A Sikkimese watercolor painting on cotton that depicts Mañjuśrī, accompanied by a white Tārā with seven eyes and Viśrāvaṇa, the chief of the Four Heavenly Kings. The figures are reportedly modeled after the Macrae family.

The tanka includes a silk cover and ribbons.

Publisher Elliott Beach Macrae (1900-1968) was given the tanka by Tashi Namgyal (1893-1963), the Maharaja Chogyal of Sikkim, circa 1950.

Tsewang Norbu was an artist in Darjeeling, India.

Gautama Buddha (circa 563 BCE-483 BCE), also known as Śākyamuni, was a spiritual teacher from ancient India who founded Buddhism.

A watercolor painting on cotton that depicts Gautama Buddha surrounded by nine figures. The painting also depicts the male and female patron on the painting in Sanskrit expressed in phonetic Tibetan, Bhalaram Norbu and Bhanavati Drolma.

Inscription in Tibetan on the verso, which venerates Gautama Buddha, the patrons, and the artist.

Unidentified Tibetan Artist

Two tankas created by an unidentified Tibetan artist based on Jātakas, a body of literature native to India concerning the previous births (jāti) of the Gautama Buddha.

Akṣobhya

Akṣobhya is one of the Five Wisdom Buddhas, a product of the Adi-Buddha, who represents consciousness as an aspect of reality.

Amitābha

Amitābha, also known as "The Buddha of Infinite Light," is a celestial buddha known for his longevity and the deep awareness of individualities.

Amitāyus is also used for the Sambhogakāya aspect of Amitābha, particularly associated with longevity.

Arhats

Arhats, also known as Sthaviras, were sixteen individuals selected by Gautama Buddha from among his disciples and to remain in the world and protect the Dharma for as long as beings are capable of benefitting from the teachings. The sixteen arhats are usually depicted in tankas accompanied by their two attendants, Hva Shang and Upasaka Dharmatala, as well as by the Four Great Kings.

 The Bardo Thodol, also known as the Tibetan Book of the Dead, is a text used in Tibetan Buddhism to guide one through the experiences that the consciousness has after death, during the interval between death and the next rebirth. The first portion of the ritual is dedicated to the epiphany of the peaceful and wrathful bardo deities.

Bhaiṣajyaguru

Bhaiṣajyaguru, also known as the Medicine Buddha, is the buddha of healing and medicine in Mahāyāna Buddhism. He is described as a doctor who cures suffering using the medicine of his teachings.

Dorje Shugden, also known as Dolgyal Shugden, a deity in the Dge-lugs-pa school of Buddhism, and regarded as a Dharma Protector or "guardian angel."

Garwai Nagpo Damchen, also known as the Blacksmith, is the main attendant to Vajrasadhu, and the oath bound worldly protector of the Nyingma School.

He is below smaller figures, including Atiśa Dipankara Shrijnana (980-1054), also known as Atisha, a Buddhist teacher from the Pala Empire, and Tsoñ-kha-pa Blo-bzañ-grags-pa with two disciples, as well as two protective divinities. He is above smaller figures of divinities, including Begtse, Yama, Yami, and Lha-mo.

Vajrapāṇi

Vajrapāṇi is a Buddhist bodhisattva and the protector and guide of Gautama Buddha.

Vajrasattva is a bodhisattva associated with the Dharmakaya and with purification practice.

Vajrayoginī

Vajrayoginī is the Vajra yoginī, literally 'the diamond female yogi'. Her practice includes methods for preventing ordinary death, intermediate state (bardo) and rebirth (by transforming them into paths to enlightenment), and for transforming all mundane daily experiences into higher spiritual paths.
