Sylvia Plath (1932-1963)

Sylvia Plath was an American poet, best known for the poetry collections, *The Colossus and Other Poems* (1960) and *Ariel* (1965), and the novel, *The Bell Jar* (1963). Plath was born in Boston, Massachusetts on October 27, 1932 to Aurelia Schober Plath and Otto Plath. Her brother, Warren Plath was born in 1935. While Plath was growing up, her family lived in Jamaica Plain, Winthrop, and Wellesley, Massachusetts.

Plath attended Smith College, and after graduation, attended Newnham College at Cambridge University on a Fulbright fellowship. While at Cambridge, she met English poet Ted Hughes, and the two were married on June 16, 1956. Following Plath's graduation from Cambridge in 1957, she and Hughes relocated to the United States until 1959, then they returned to England.

After returning to England, Plath published *Colossus and Other Poems*, wrote *The Bell Jar*, and completed the poems that would comprise *Ariel*. Additionally, Plath's and Hughes' children, Frieda Hughes (b. April 1, 1960) and Nicholas Hughes (b. January 17, 1962) were born during this period.

Plath lived with and was treated for clinical depression throughout her adult life, and depictions of mental illness were a recurrent theme in her writing. Sylvia Plath died by suicide in London on February 11, 1963.

In 1975, a collection of Plath's letters to her family, compiled by Aurelia Plath, was published as *Letters Home*. In 1981, her *Collected Poems* was posthumously awarded the Pulitzer Prize.

Ted Hughes (1930-1998)

Ted Hughes was an English poet, husband of Sylvia Plath, and father of their two children, Frieda and Nicholas Hughes. Born on August 17, 1930, Hughes grew up in West Yorkshire, England. He had two siblings, Gerald Hughes and Olwyn Hughes. Hughes attended Pembroke College at Cambridge University, where he

studied English, anthropology, and archaeology. His poetry was widely published throughout his lifetime, and in 1984, he was appointed Poet Laureate of the United Kingdom, a title he held until his death.

In 1962, while married to Sylvia Plath, Hughes began an extramarital affair with writer Assia Wevill, which resulted in his and Plath's separation. Hughes and Wevill remained partnered after Plath's death and had one daughter together, Alexandra (Shura) Hughes, born in 1965. Both Assia Wevill and Shura Hughes died on March 23, 1969 in a murder-suicide carried out by Wevill. In 1970, Hughes married Carol Orchard, and they remained married until Hughes' death on October 28, 1998.

Aurelia Plath (1906-1994)

Aurelia Plath was an American university professor, wife of Otto Plath, and mother of Sylvia and Warren Plath. She was born Aurelia Schober on April 26, 1906, in Boston to parents Frank Schober and Aurelia Greenwood Schober. She had two siblings, Dorothy Schober (later Dorothy Benotti) and Frank Schober, Jr.

Plath attended Boston University's College of Practical Arts and Letters and graduated with a Bachelor of Secretarial Sciences degree in 1928. She subsequently completed a Master of Arts degree in English and German at Boston University in 1930. She married Otto Plath in 1932, and their children, Sylvia and Warren Plath were born in 1932 and 1935, respectively.

Following Otto Plath's death in 1940, Aurelia began working as an instructor of medical secretarial skills at Boston University and attained the rank of associate professor. Plath retired from teaching in 1971. In the later years of her life, she was actively involved in the stewardship of Sylvia Plath's posthumous legacy, and compiled the collection, *Letters Home*, published in 1975. Aurelia Plath died on March 11, 1994.

Otto Plath (1885-1940)

Otto Plath was a German-American entomologist and university professor, husband of Aurelia Plath, and father of Sylvia and Warren Plath.

Otto Plath was born on April 13, 1885, in Grabow, Germany, the oldest of six children. In 1900 at the age of 15, Plath emigrated to the United States, initially living with an uncle in New York City before moving to Wisconsin to live with his grandparents. From 1906 to 1910, Plath attended college at Northwestern University, earning a bachelor's degree in classical languages. Following a brief tenure at the Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, Plath moved to Seattle and earned a Master of Arts degree from the University of Washington. Beginning in 1922, Plath taught at Boston University. During this time, he completed both a Master of Science and Doctoral degree at Harvard University. In 1929, he met Aurelia Schober while she was a graduate student at Boston University.

Otto Plath began to suffer from a long-term illness in 1935 that was ultimately diagnosed as advanced diabetes. He died on November 5, 1940.

Warren Plath (1935-2021)

Warren Plath was an American computer scientist, son of Aurelia and Otto Plath, and brother of Sylvia Plath. He was born in Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts on April 27, 1935. Plath attended Philips Exeter Academy and Harvard University for both his undergraduate and graduate degrees, ultimately earning a Ph.D in 1964. He also attended the University of Bonn in Germany on a Fulbright Fellowship. An expert in the field of theoretical and computational linguistics, Plath spent his career as a researcher at IBM's T.J. Watson Research Center until his retirement in 2001.

In 1960, Plath met Margaret Wetzel and the two married in 1962. The couple had two daughters, Jennifer and Susan Plath (later Susan Winston). Warren Plath died on February 14, 2021.

Scope and Contents

The Plath family papers document the life and work of American poet Sylvia Plath, her relationship with her family, the lives of her parents, Aurelia and Otto Plath, and her brother, Warren Plath. The papers consist of correspondence, personal and professional papers of members of the Plath family, photographs, and audiovisual materials.

Correspondence in the papers is notable for including letters between Sylvia Plath and her immediate family; letters between Ted Hughes and members of the Plath family; extensive correspondence between Aurelia and Warren Plath; and letters written by Ted Hughes's partner Assia Wevill to Aurelia Plath. Sylvia Plath's correspondence includes some letters that were published in *Letters Home*. The papers also include documentation of Sylvia Plath's death and its immediate aftermath, including correspondence between family members, letters to the Plath family from Sylvia Plath's friends, notebooks maintained by Warren and Margaret Plath, and official documentation.

Personal and professional papers of Aurelia, Otto, and Warren Plath include diaries and notebooks, educational records, writings, clippings, and other papers. Aurelia Plath's papers include extensive documentation of the production and publication of *Letters Home*, which she was heavily involved in. Many of the letters featured in the book can be found in the correspondence.

Photographs document Sylvia Plath throughout her life, other Plath and Schober family members, and Ted, Frieda, and Nicholas Hughes.

Audiovisual materials include commercially-produced recordings of Sylvia Plath reading her poems, interviews with Aurelia Plath, and recordings of television programs about Sylvia Plath.
