Biographical / Historical

Julian Joel Obermann (1888-1956) was born in Warsaw, Poland. He received his Ph.D., University of Vienna, 1915 and M.A. (honorary) from Yale University in 1935. Obermann emigrated to the United States in 1923. Obermann held several teaching positions: professor of Semitic languages, University of Hamburg, Germany (1919-1922?); professor of Semitic philology, Jewish Institute of Religion, New York, 1923-1931; professor, Hebrew University of Jerusalem, 1929-1930; visiting professor and professor of Semitic languages, Yale University, 1932-1956. Obermann served as co-editor of the Journal of Biblical Literature (1934-1938) and editor-in-chief of the Yale Judaica Series (1944-1956). Obermann specialized in semitic languages, Old Testament and Ugartic studies, and Islamic and Arabic culture and philosophy. He authored, edited and translated several works, including *Das Problem der Kausalitaet bei den Arabern* (1916); *Der philosophische and religioese Subjektivismus Ghazalis* (1921); *The Arabic Original of Ibn Shahin's Book of Comfort* (1933); *Inscribed Tiles from the Synagogue of Dura* (1942), Ugaritic Mythology (1948), Hugo Gressman's *Tower of Babel* (1928), and Soloman Gandz's translation of Maimonides' *Sanctification of the New Moon* (1956).

Obermann never married. He died in New Haven, Connecticut, on October 17, 1956 at the age of 68.

Scope and Contents

The papers consist of correspondence, lectures, presentations, writings, teaching and committee files documenting the research, writing, editing, and teaching of Julian Joel Obermann, professor of Semitic languages at Yale University and editor of the Yale Oriental Series and the Yale Judaica Series. The correspondence is primarily incoming and is both personal and professional in nature. Most of the lectures, presentations, and writings are drafts, identified and unidentified, and range from partial to complete manuscripts. The writings document Obermann's writing and editing projects, including *The Arabic Original of Ibn Shahin's Book of Comfort* (1933); *Inscribed Tiles from the Synagogue of Dura* (1942), *Ugaritic Mythology* (1948), Gressman's Tower of Babel (1928), *The Code of Maimonides* (1948-1949), and Gandz's Maimonides' *Sanctification of the New Moon* (1956). The bulk of the papers consist of Obermann's notebooks, which he kept for much of his career. The notebooks contain manuscript writings, lectures,

and editorial and research notes. Most are not identified and have not been organized or individually described. Files on the American Oriental Society, the Committee on Judaica Research, the Judaica Research Committee, the Semitic and Biblical Club (Yale), and the Near East Languages and Literature Department (Yale), though few in number, document Obermann's leadership and interest in promoting semitic and Judaica studies. The papers also include a few legal documents, photographs, and newspaper clippings.

Arrangement

Organized into five series and one addition: I. Correspondence, 1913 - 1956. II. Presentations and lectures, circa 1930-1955. III. Writings, circa 1920-1955. IV. Academic files, 1917 - 1954. V. Personal and biographical files, 1915 - 1954.

Collection Contents Series I: Correspondence, 1913–1956

The correspondence is primarily incoming and is both personal and professional in nature. A substantial amount of undated correspondence is filed at the end of the series. Additional correspondence is filed with committee files in Series IV. Academic files.

Series III: Writings, circa 1920-1955

The Writing series forms the bulk of the papers. It consists of manuscripts and drafts, partial and full, of Obermann's writing and editing projects, notebooks kept by Obermann, writings of others as well as unidentified manuscripts. File titles are transcribed or supplied based on the topic of the work. If known or suspected to be related, files on the same work or subject are collocated. File titles may not reflect the final titles of works documented in the series. Obermann's notebooks contain manuscript writings, lectures, and editorial and research notes. Most are not identified and have not been organized or individually described.

Files related to the The Book of Maimonides (Yale Judaica Series) is filed in Series IV under American Oriental Society Yale Judaica Series.

Obermann's writings are arranged alphabetically by title or subject, followed by unidentified Obermann (?) manuscripts, including notebooks. A small number of manuscripts writings of others is filed at the end of the series.
