Biographical / Historical

Herbert King Thoms, M.D. was a Yale obstetrician, historian of medicine, and artist/engraver. Born in 1885 in Waterbury, Connecticut, his early education was acquired at the Vermont Academy and the Waterbury High School. He received his M.D. from Yale in 1910. Following internships at the Backus Hospital in Norwich and Memorial Hospital in New London, he served as an assistant resident at the Sloane Hospital for Women in New York City. Then, having decided to specialize in obstetrics, he spent a year at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. In 1915, he returned to New Haven where he began an active practice in obstetrics. He was appointed an associate clinical professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Yale, and in 1927 he became a member of the full-time faculty. He became chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology in 1947, a position he held until his retirement in 1953. During his academic career, he made many important contributions in his field including studies in pelvimetry, the plan for infant "rooming-in" after delivery in conjunction with Dr. Edith Jackson and members of the Department of Pediatrics, the "natural child birth" program, and studies in the Yale infertility clinic which he established. As a teacher, he was influential in bringing to the attention of his students the importance of a humanistic approach to medicine. Throughout his career he was a prolific author of books and articles on the history of medicine. His special interest was the early history of Connecticut medicine. In addition to his clinical and historical activities, he found the time to become an accomplished artist and engraver.

Scope and Contents

The collection consists of correspondence, particularly a set of letters from Grantly Dick-Read; a nearly full set of articles by Thoms; and 11 scrapbooks and photograph albums concerning his years as a Yale medical student and early faculty member, his work on natural childbirth and rooming-in, and his interest in the history of Connecticut medicine.

Collection Contents

Series I: Correspondence

The correspondence represents materials that Thoms selected for the Library. Former Librarian of the Historical Collection, Madeline Stanton, wrote on one envelope of letters, "Letters that Dr. Thoms thought of some interest & importance & had therefore saved. Brought to H. L. [Historical Library] Nov. 1964."

Series IV: Published articles, 1910-1971

These were donated by Thoms to the Library and numbered by Madeline Stanton, Librarian of the Historical Collections. "Bibliography of Herbert Thoms" was published in the "Herbert Thoms Number," Yale Journal of Biology and Medicine, 25(6) (June 1953): 461-467. With the articles is a folder of Thoms and Stanton's notes on his bibliography. With Thoms's help, Stanton drafted a bibliography through 1960. Folders contain professional articles on obstetrics, articles on history of medicine, and popular articles.

Series V: Scrapbooks

b. 5	Yale scrapbook Scrapbook created when Thoms was a medical student at Yale. Like many other medical students in this period, Thoms had not attended a college. The medical school experience became like a college experience. The scrapbook has clippings and memorabilia on Yale sports, music, and other campus activities, as well as medical school materials. Thoms graduated from Yale School of Medicine in 1910.	1906-1910
b. 6	Yale and professional scrapbook Includes reprints, invitations and announcements, and clippings related mostly to his professional activities. Of note is his opening of an office in New Haven in 1914 and a brochure, <i>Some Rules for Pregnant Women</i> , by Herbert Thoms, M.D. Organizations represented include the Connecticut State Medical Society, the New York Obstetrical Society, the American Gynecological Society, Nu Sigma Nu, and the Beaumont Medical Club.	1910-1932
b. 7	Scrapbook of clippings about natural childbirth Scrapbook of newspaper clippings related to Thoms's pioneering program at Grace-New Haven Hospital to train women for "natural childbirth" (i.e., without anesthetics).	1947-1950
b. 8	Scrapbook of magazine articles on natural childbirth and rooming-in At the same time as Thoms was training women for natural childbirth, Edith Jackson, M.D., and members of the Yale School of Nursing were pioneering the practice of "rooming-in" whereby the newborn remained in the hospital room with the mother.	1947-1950
b. 9	Scrapbook: "Medical Landmarks in Connecticut, Vol. I" Thoms was interested in the history of medicine from the beginning of his career. This scrapbook contains photographs by Thoms of homes and memorials related to early Connecticut physicians, along with Thoms's lengthy labels on the physicians. Names include William Henry Welch, Reuben Smith, Samuel Seabury, Erasmus Darwin Hudson, Elisha North, Simeon Smith, Oliver Wolcott, Seth Bird, Elihu Hubbard Smith, Samuel W. Gold, and Daniel Sheldon. Thoms's scrapbooks on the history of medicine appear to date from the 1950s.	
b. 9	Scrapbook: "Medical Landmarks in Connecticut, Vol. II" Scrapbook contains more photographs, mostly taken by Thoms, of monuments, homes, and buildings related to early Connecticut physicians. These are accompanied by typed labels. Among the homes and memorials covered are the Stafford Springs House, Laboratory of Applied Physiology (Yale), Elisha Perkins House, Governor Peters House, William Tully House, Alcott Schoolhouse, John Winthrop Memorial, Alexander Wolcott House, Horace Wells Memorial, The Parsonage (Canterbury), William Beaumont Homestead, Noah Webster House, Benjamin Silliman House, Gaylord Farm Sanatorium, Timothy Dwight College and memorial to Eli Ives, 150 York Street (former home of the Yale School of Medicine), Blue Hills Hospital, Joseph A. Barratt Memorial, William Beaumont Memorial, Thomas Miner birthplace, Horace H. Hayden Memorial, and the Elnathan Chauncey House.	

- b. 10 Scrapbook: "Medical Landmarks in Connecticut, Vol. III"
Scrapbook contains more of Thoms's annotated photographs on landmarks related to Connecticut medicine. Photos include the Philip Turner House; home of Eli Todd; Chester Hunt medical office; birthplace of James Gates Percival; Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station, 1958; the Institute of Living; Lyman Hall Memorial; Blue Hills Hospital; Shaw Mansion (Nathaniel Shaw Perkins); Meigs-Bishop House, Stokes House (Faculty Club, where Clifford Beers and others founded the Connecticut Society for Mental Hygiene); Joseph W. Alsop House; Daniel Lathrop House; David Bushnell Memorial; Rufus Blakeman House; and home of Benjamin Silliman (Fairfield).

- b. 10 Scrapbook: "William Beaumont Memorial, Lebanon, Connecticut"
Scrapbook containing articles, letters, and photographs concerning physician and physiologist William Beaumont (1785-1853), and the dedication of a memorial in his birthplace of Lebanon, Connecticut on June 29, 1926. The Beaumont Medical Club at Yale played a major role in establishing the memorial. The scrapbook also contains memorabilia on other memorials to Beaumont.

- b. 11 Jared Eliot Scrapbook, Volume I
Scrapbook containing labeled photographs, copies of letters, and newspaper clippings concerning the eighteenth-century Connecticut minister/physician and agricultural improver, Jared Eliot (1685-1763), an early graduate of Yale College.

- b. 11 Jared Eliot Scrapbook, Volume II
Scrapbook containing the labelled photographs that Herbert Thoms took of Jared Eliot's home in Guilford, the restoration of his tombstone, and tombstones of members of Eliot's family.

- b. 11 Scrapbook of newspaper articles on Thoms's engravings
Thoms was an accomplished engraver who exhibited his works locally. He especially created etchings and charcoal drawings of Yale buildings, Connecticut buildings and landscapes (among them early physician's homes), and sailboats. The Historical Library holds several examples of Thoms's artwork.
